1. At 1:30 p.m., Chairman Clendenning called the meeting to order.
2. Public comments. None.
3. Moved by LaFontaine, seconded by Wagner, to approve the minutes of the August 4 and 22, 2017, Committee meetings. All ayes.
4. The Committee reviewed monthly voucher reports of the departments they oversee. Moved by LaFontaine, seconded by Wagner, to approve the payment of vouchers. All ayes.
5. The Committee reviewed department reports:
Moved by LaFontaine, seconded by Wagner, to approve the department reports. All ayes.

Vruwink explained why the FTE (full-time equivalent) numbers were what they were in the Child Support 2018 proposed budget.

There were no revised budgets.
6. The Committee reviewed the notices of injury/claim of Elizabeth Duerr, Brianne Moore, and Nanci Olson. These notices will be provided to the county board.
7. There was one new animal claim against the County. Moved by Wagner, seconded by LaFontaine, to approve the claim of Castlerock Veterinary Hospital in the amount of \$83.00 for rabies testing of a stray animal. All ayes.
8. The Committee reviewed correspondence and legislative issues.
 - a. WCA resolution on the opioid epidemic. Moved by Wagner, seconded by Leichtnam, to support the proposal to send a resolution to the county board to participate in litigation against opiate manufacturers and to have the Corporation Counsel finalize the resolution working with the WCA draft resolution. All ayes.

- b. Resolution regarding allocation of PECFA funds. Explanation by Supervisor Winch on his proposal to use the currently allocated 2¢ of gas tax that goes to PECFA (Petroleum Environmental Cleanup Fund Award program) to counties via the general transportation aids to counties. Moved by LaFontaine, seconded by Leichtnam, to approve the resolution. All ayes.
 - c. Resolution addressing use of buggies on highways. Supervisor Winch is working with the sheriff's department to draft a resolution that will be brought back to this committee for co-sponsorship.
 - d. Resolution allocating environmental impact fee. Supervisor Winch continues to look into this matter.
9. County Board rules.
- a. Rule 42 - contracting for architectural services. Concern was expressed about the Health & Human Services Committee having directed the retention of an architectural firm to provide services when funds were not budgeted for same. Corporation Counsel was directed to prepare a memo on the topic to keep this from happening again.
 - b. Rule 40A - selection of committee chairs. Supervisor Clendenning proposed in a draft resolution to have the main committees elect their own chairs. Those chairs will then all serve on the Executive Committee. The draft resolution will be provided to the Committee in advance of the next meeting and further discussed then.
 - c. Resolution on Executive Committee membership. Moved by LaFontaine, seconded by Clendenning, to table resolution to the next meeting. All ayes.
 - d. Creation of Public Property Committee. The Executive Committee recently created a 3-person ad hoc committee but Chairman Clendenning prefers a 5-person/county board supervisor Public Property Committee, which would report directly to the County Board. Discussion had. No action taken.
10. County Ordinances.
- a. #905 - \$1,000 cap on dog damage claims. Discussion had; no changes.
 - b. #906 - provisions in self-organized county section. Discussion had; no changes.
 - c. #908 - overpayments and underpayments. Change from \$4 to \$10. Moved by LaFontaine, seconded by Wagner, to increase from \$4 to \$10. All ayes.

11. Committee goals.

WCA Conference Resolutions Advisory Meeting Minutes
Monday, September 11, 2017
Wood County Courthouse, Room 114

Meeting was called to order at 10:00 p.m. by Supervisor Clendenning.

In attendance at the meeting were: Judicial and Legislative Committee members Clendenning, Leichtnam and Curry. Excused was Supervisors LaFontaine. Not present was Supervisor Wagner. Present also were Chairman Pliml, County Clerk Cepress, WCA Deputy Director of Government Affairs, Sara Diedrick-Kasdorf.

Not every resolution was discussed or commented on, but was reviewed and are noted below along with the WCA's Resolution's Committee recommendation for action. Sarah Diedrick-Kasdorf (SDK) commented and offered a synopsis of resolutions as questions were brought up and offered any background and insight from the WCA steering committees and the resolutions committee. SDK broke down the proposed action on the 61 resolutions into 3 categories; 44 recommended for adoption, 14 to indefinitely postpone and 3 to refer to the board of directors.

CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

Res. #1– Supporting Full Funding of the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative – Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. Supervisor Leichtnam questioned if the resolution covered tributaries also and how many years the \$300M is meant to cover. Discussion and clarification from SDK.

Res. #2 – Supporting an Increase in Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) for County Forest Lands - Steering Committee recommends adoption. Resolutions Committee recommends indefinitely postponement. Short discussion as to the reasons for the varied recommendations.

Res. #3 – Responding to the Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau Report “Wastewater Permitting and Enforcement, June 2016” - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt.

Res. # 4 – Opposing the Back Forty Mine – Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends refer to the Board of Directors. SDK explained that there are many open ended implications with this resolution that the WCA did not want to become obligated to.

Res. #5 - Supporting the Paris Climate Agreement - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends referring to the Board of Directors. Expecting a lot of discussion at the conference regarding this resolution. WCA's concern is the specific directives that are outlined that they would be obligated to.

Res. #6 – Supporting Reinstating the Forestation State Tax – Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends referring to the Board of Directors. SDK explained that it was referred to the board because at the time the steering committee met, it was an item in the

state budget. Another concern with the resolutions comes with the language 'appropriate level' when referring to funding.

Res. #7 – Adopting Public Participation Procedures for Updating the Multi-Jurisdictional Comprehensive Plan for Walworth County. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends indefinite postponement. SDK stated that Walworth County probably sent this in error.

Res. #8 – Recommending Change in Unemployment Compensation Rules; Res. #9 – Recommending Change in Unemployment Compensation Rules– Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. SDK indicated that there were many varied opinions to the question based on whether you were from a highly tourism based county or not.

Res. #10 – Recommending Amendment to Wisconsin statute 59.22 - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends indefinite postponement. SDK explained that this subject has already been debated previously. WCA Supports and doesn't need to add a third position on same subject.

Res. #11 - Supporting Proposed Legislation Allowing an Exception to Copy a Vital Record– Steering Committee recommends adoption as amended. Resolutions Committee recommends to indefinitely postpone. Due to timing, this is a moot point.

Res. #12 – Supporting a County Option Relating To Highway Committee/Commissioner Duties and Powers - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends indefinite postponement. Same resolution was presented in 2016 that was referred to the board. It is unclear what they want.

Res. #13-Res. #15

Res. #13 – Supporting Creation of a Nonpartisan Procedure for the Preparation of Legislative and Congressional Redistricting Plans – Steering Committee recommends indefinite postponement and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. **Res. #14 – Creating a Nonpartisan Procedure for the Preparation of Legislative and Congressional Redistricting Plans –** Steering Committee recommends indefinite postponement and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. **Res. #15 –Supporting Creation of a Nonpartisan Procedure the Preparation of Legislative and Congressional Redistricting Plans–** Steering Committee recommends indefinite postponement and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. Resolutions 13 – 15 all call for non-partisan redistricting. Staff recommends indefinite postponement. WCA feels it will hurt their lobbying position. Similar resolution was presented at 2014 conference and was indefinitely postponed. Probable amendments from the floor. WCA has current position already that the state uses the lines drawn by counties.

Res. # 16 – Advocating for Cooperative Extension Funding - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. This would mean more federal funding which is appealing to all.

Res. #17 and #18 Opposing the UW-Cooperative Extension Multi-County Reorganization Plan. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends indefinitely postpone. Due to timing, this is no longer an issue. Reorganization is taking place.

Res. #19 – Supporting the Governor’s budget Proposals to Lower the Lead Poisoning Definition and to Increase the Medicaid Reimbursement Available for Lead Investigations - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. Defines a lower lead poisoning level.

Res. #20 – Encouraging the United States Senate to Pass Senate Bill 2680 – Mental Health Reform Act of 2016 - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. Relates to federal strengthening of mental health services.

It was noted that the Chairman will ask for a suspension of the rules to allow for voting on multiple resolutions with one vote.

Res. #21 – Supporting Retention and Expansion of Wisconsin’s Aging and Disability Resource Centers’ Dementia Care Specialist Program and Promoting the Work of the Dementia Coalition in Eau Claire County. Res. #22 – Requesting the legislature Restore funding in the 2017 – 2019 State budget for Dementia Care Specialist Positions - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt.

Res. #23 – Alzheimer’s Disease and Dementia - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends indefinite postponement. SDK explains that WCA has already taken positions on most of this.

Res. #24 – Res. #27

Res. #24 – Requesting Adequate Funding from the State and Federal Government for Medicare and Medicaid Reimbursement to Skilled Nursing Facilities. Res. #25 – Requesting the State Legislature Increase Nursing Home Medicaid funding. Res. #26 – Requesting an Increase in Medicaid Reimbursement Rates. Res. #27 – Urging the Wisconsin Legislature and governor to Enact Legislation to Increase Medicaid Reimbursement Rates. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. SDK explains that 24-27 are very similar and are asking for increased reimbursements.

Res. #28 – Res. #33 Supporting Increased Funding in the Children and Family Aids Allocation. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. SDK explains that Resolutions 28 – 33 are very similar and asking for increased funding to counties for service children and families.

Res. #34 – Supporting WCA’s Efforts to Establish a Statewide 9-1-1 ESInet. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. SDK explained need to move forward to next generation 9-1-1.

Res. #35 – Supporting State Funding to Hire more Prosecutors for County-Based District Attorney’s Offices Without Counting County-Funded Positions when Assessing Need or Distributing Prosecutor Positions. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. SDK explained briefly that some counties fund their own prosecutor positions and thus are damaged by the process used to determine allocations of positions by the state.

Res. #36 – Requesting that Circuit Judges be Given Discretion Regarding Adding the DNA Surcharge to Each and Every Count in Criminal Judgements of Conviction. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. SDK explained the current practice and implications of charge fees for each DNA testing.

Res. #37 – Requesting the State Legislature Enact Legislation Authorizing Counties to Impose up to .1% Sales Tax Exclusively for Economic Development, Tourism and Infrastructure for the Same. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt.

Res. #38 – Res. #44 - Supporting Efforts to Close Commercial Property Assessment Loopholes. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. These resolutions all relate to ‘dark stores’.

Res. #45 – Supporting Continued Funding of the Essential Air Service (EAS) Program - Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to adopt. SDK related that the WCA will write a caption so that it applies to all airports.

Res. #46 – Supporting the Completion of the Environmental Impact Study for the USH 12 Extension Project and Urging the State of Wisconsin to Include this Project in the Transportation Improvement Program for Southeastern Wisconsin: 2017-2020. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to indefinitely postpone. SDK explained that this is too local and specific to add to WCA platform.

Res. #47 – Urging Elected Officials to Direct the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to Complete the USH 12 Environmental Impact Study. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to indefinitely postpone. SDK explained that this is too local and specific to add to WCA platform.

Res. #48 – Urging the Surface Transportation Board to Conduct a Thorough Environmental Impact Statement for the Proposed Great Lakes Basin Railroad. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to indefinitely postpone. SDK explained that this is too local and specific to add to WCA platform.

Res. #49 – Supporting The Initiation Of Passenger Rail Service Between West Central Wisconsin And The Twin Cities. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommends to indefinitely postpone. SDK explained that this is too local and specific to add to WCA platform.

Res. #50 – Supporting Proposed Plan for Salary Increases for all University of Wisconsin Employees. Steering Committee had no recommendation . Resolutions Committee recommends to indefinitely postpone. SDK explains that the WCA is not able or inclined to lobby on behalf of UW employees.

Res. #51 – Encouraging Financial Support by the State of Wisconsin for LaCrosse Center Expansion Project. Steering Committee had no recommendation. Resolutions Committee recommends to indefinitely postpone. SDK explained that this again is too local and specific to add to WCA platform. However did state that WCA sent a letter in support of the project as they utilize that facility for conferences.

Res. #52 – Res. 61 – These resolutions are reaffirming positions already maintained within the WCA's adopted platform. Steering Committee and Resolutions Committee recommend adoption of all.

SDK brought the committee up to date on transportation issues within the state budget. Supervisor Leichtnam stated his wish for far sightedness in regard to water issues. SDK encouraged pursuing a seat on the Environment and Land Use Steering Committee as a good way to have voice heard.

At 11:10 a.m. Chair Clendenning declared the meeting adjourned.

MONTHLY REPORT TO THE JUDICIAL AND LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

October 2017

1. Goals. Memorandum entitled: "Waivers of State Mandates."
2. Rodeghier appeal. Mr. Rodeghier had appealed his termination as an employee of Norwood for failing to leave the lobby and attend to his job duties. The county board heard the Complaint Resolution Process appeal and decided that no policies were violated in terminating Rodeghier's employment. Rodeghier then petitioned the state's Equal Rights Division (ERD) alleging that he was discriminated against in the termination of his employment. The first step in such a process is for the state to appoint an investigator (ERO - Equal Rights Officer) to ascertain if there is probable cause to believe he was discriminated against based upon any of the protected bases of discrimination. The ERO determined recently that no such probable cause exists. Mr. Rodeghier can now appeal that determination to the ERD by requesting a hearing on the allegations.
3. New duties. A part of the budget bill was a provision that places some responsibilities on counties to locate placements for people who were committed as a sexually violent person and are appropriate for supervised release. The proposed revisions to Wis. Stat. Ch. 980 obligated the county to establish a committee consisting of various folks, including the corporation counsel, to develop an appropriate residential option for the placement of the subject in the county. There are strict time limits on preparing the report; the failure to comply will result in significant penalties (\$500 - \$1,000 per day). The state would then use the report to effectuate a placement of the person. As I recall from the news, the genesis of the legislation is the dissatisfaction of legislators in having sexually violent persons placed in their communities when they aren't from the area. The law would force counties to locate such residents within their own counties. Anyway, the reason I bring the matter to your attention is that the meetings at which these cases would be discussed and residential options identified would be open meetings and emotionally charged with residents not wanting these residential options to be near their homes and so on. Meanwhile, the committee, which would be appointed by the county board chair and approved by the county board, need not have any elected persons on it. So, this is one of those politically charged matters that I felt should be brought to your attention. The governor vetoed the proposed modification to Ch. 980, the sexually violent person statute. He did so not for policy reasons but for procedural ones as he felt the budget bill shouldn't be used for a proposed change in the law such as this; rather, the proposal should be vetted through the regular legislative process. In that enactment of such legislation in the future will present implementation difficulties at the local level, you now have time to work with the legislators to discuss those issues.
4. Courts. Now that the budget bill has passed it might be a good time for the committee to start working with the county's judges to ascertain the need, likelihood and time frame for a fourth judge. Figuring out what the status of the judiciary will be in 5 years and 10 years should enable the committee to then work with the Clerk of Courts, Register in Probate and District Attorney as to their future staffing and space needs so that from this both short-term and long-term planning can be made for renovations to the third floor of the courthouse.



- Department of Children and Families Secretary Eloise Anderson will be visiting the Child Support Agency on October 3rd. We are honored to have her visit the agency and look forward to discussing the more family focused approach our agency has taken.
- All agency staff attended training on September 20th. Human Services sponsored the training and it was very well received. The presenter Carl the "Energizer" Olsen left staff motivated and offered new approaches to successfully deal with the daily struggles we face within our profession.
- I will be attending a meeting that WCA is facilitating between Child Support Directors and Human Services Directors in Stevens Point on September 29th. WCA wants to discuss a new foster care referral policy that is being implemented by the Department of Children and Families.
- Governor Walker officially signed the state budget which leaves funding for county child support agencies flat for the next two years. The budget does expand the Supporting Parents Supporting Kids Program (SPSK) to three additional counties in 2019. The program offers enhanced employment and training assistance and parenting skills to help non-custodial parents become more financially and emotionally involved with their children. 

She gave indications that she was planning on committing suicide to at least one of the above-named employees, and yet she was left alone in a cellblock without proper monitoring. Her death was therefore caused by the negligence, willful and wanton misconduct, and/or deliberate indifference of the above-named officers, officials, agents, and/or employees.

Claimants assert that the acts or omissions complained of were carried out under the authority of Wood County and were not the intentional or malicious acts of the named individuals or an exercise of legislative, quasi-legislative, judicial, or quasi-judicial authority of the County.



I WAS THEN TOLD BY THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, THAT MR. RADEN HAD TOLD THEM THAT HE OWNED MY FARM, AND THAT I ONLY WORKED FOR HIM. THE DEPUTIES THEN TOLD ME THAT THEY THEN ASKED HIM WHEN HE PLANNED TO TAKE THE COWS TO ANOTHER FARM, AND TOLD MR. CALL THE AG DEPARTMENT IN MADISON AND ASK WHO WAS THE SOLE PROPRIETOR ON THE MILK HAULING CONTRACT... OR CONTACT EQUITY GIVESTOCK OF STRATFORD WISCONSIN TO VERIFY OWNERSHIP.)

TRUTH BE TOLD, YOUR OWN COUNTY OFFICIALS HAD ALREADY USED THE D.A.'S OFFICE TO SUE ME OVER MY REFUSAL TO ALLOW A SEPTIC INSPECTION, AND THE FINE THEY LEVIED ON ME AS THE OWNER OF THE FARM. THEY DID THIS ONLY A FEW MONTHS BEFORE, IN MAY, 2008. I EVEN HAD TO QUASH A WARRANT ON SEPTEMBER 5, 2008 BY GOING TO THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE AND FILLING OUT SOME SORT OF FINANCIAL DISCLOSURE AFFIDAVIT RELATED TO THE FINE AND LAWSUIT. THE SAME D.A.'S OFFICE ALSO CHARGED ME 3 SEPERATE TIMES IN 2008 WITH CRIMES THAT RESULTED IN FINES RELATED TO FARMING, AS THE OWNER.

THIS MAKES THEM ALL PARTY TO THE CRIME REGARDING THE THEFT OF 80 COWS AND CALVES, A TRACTOR, 50,000 IN BREEDING EQUIPMENT AND FARM EQUIPMENT, AS WELL AS CROPS AND FEED COMMODITIES, OVER \$750,000 IN ACTUAL LOSSES AT THE TIME THAT HAVE SINCE BECOME \$31,217,960/LOST ON JUST THE RAPIDS FARM IN MILK PRODUCTION, BABIES BORN, BEEF SOLD, CROPS RAISED AND ACTUAL REAL ESTATE.

THE KENTUCKY LAND CAN NOT BE CALLED A LOSS SINCE REAL ESTATE CONTRACTS MUST BE IN WRITING, HOWEVER, THE CATTLE AND COMMODITIES CAN TRANSFER OWNERSHIP THROUGH A VERBAL CONTRACT, WHICH I HAD IN PLACE WITH

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THE FARMER / JUDGE. THE THEFT OF MY CATTLE COST ME ALL THIS NEW MONEY. IT ALSO CAUSED ME TO BE FORECLOSED ON TWICE, AND LOSE MY MINNESOTA FARM THAT I HAD UNDER CONTRACT FOR DEED, AS OF MAY, 2008. THAT FARM DID NOT COME WITH ANY LIVESTOCK.

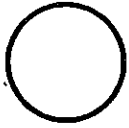

WHEREAS, the Wisconsin Public Records Law (PRL) exempts from public access employee personnel records including performance evaluations per s. 19.36(10), Wis. Stats., and

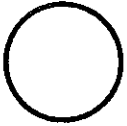
WHEREAS, the term employee is a term of art as it is defined in the PRL at s. 19.32(1bg), Wis. Stats., to exclude a person holding a local public office, and

WHEREAS, a local public office is defined at s. 19.32(1dm), Wis. Stats. to include an individual who serves as the head of a department, agency, or division of a local governmental entity, and

WHEREAS, this means that the performance evaluations of department heads are open records and not exempt from public access as are the performance evaluations of other county personnel, and

WHEREAS, having department head performance evaluations open to the public is problematic in several ways, including:

1. It makes it more difficult to obtain and retain the employment of the best qualified candidates as government department heads as they are reticent to giving the media, their employees and the recipients of their department's services, direct access to their performance evaluations.
2. It makes it even more expensive for local governments and therefore taxpayers to employ qualified department heads. In the past, lower salaries for department heads were acceptable to qualified applicants in light of fully paid retirement benefits and superior health insurance programs funded by the employer. Like other government employees, department heads are now required to pay for half of their retirement benefits and the cost and quality of health insurance benefits has been reduced in the public sector as it has in much of the private sector. The lack of privacy of performance issues for department heads is yet another factor in making it necessary for local governments to pay more to obtain and retain these key leadership positions.
3. The knowledge that department head performance evaluations are open to the public has a chilling effect on the forthrightness of those conducting the evaluations. There is a natural reticence to be as candid as appropriate in preparing such reviews knowing the breadth of their availability. This both weakens the process and subjects the employing governmental entity to liability from allegations of discrimination when discipline is necessary as the department head will be more likely be able to point to equivocal performance evaluations in supporting allegations that the discipline is based upon one or more protected bases of discrimination.
4. There is no need for the public and the media to have access to local government department head performance evaluations. Department heads are overseen by local elected officials, those people the electorate feels best qualified to determine how taxes are spent and to oversee those programs in which they are expended. Local government department heads are not directly supervised by the public or the media.

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5. As with all local government employees, information related to concluded investigations of criminal activity as well as misconduct of department heads would continue to be open to the public.

WHEREAS, there is no reason to treat the records of local government department heads different than those of other local government employees.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE WOOD COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS HEREBY RESOLVES to go on record in requesting the Wisconsin Legislature to modify the Public Records Law as follows:

A. Wis. Stat. s. 19.32(1bg):

(1bg) "Employee" means any individual who is employed by an authority, ~~other than~~ including an individual holding local public office ~~or but not~~ a state public office, or any individual who is employed by an employer other than an authority.

B. Wis. Stat. s. 19.36(11):

~~(11) Records of an individual holding a local public office or a state public office. Unless access is specifically authorized or required by statute, an authority shall not provide access under s. 19.35(1) to records, except to an individual to the extent required under s. 103.13, containing information maintained, prepared, or provided by an employer concerning the home address, home electronic mail address, home telephone number, or social security number of an individual who holds a local public office or a state public office, unless the individual authorizes the authority to provide access to such information. This subsection does not apply to the home address of an individual who holds an elective public office or to the home address of an individual who, as a condition of employment, is required to reside in a specified location.~~

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no change be made to Wis. Stat. s. 19.36(10) which addresses access to local government employee personnel records and provides:

(10) **Employee personnel records.** Unless access is specifically authorized or required by statute, an authority shall not provide access under s. 19.35(1) to records containing the following information, except to an employee or the employee's representative to the extent required under s. 103.13 or to a recognized or certified collective bargaining representative to the extent required to fulfill a duty to bargain under ch. 111 or pursuant to a collective bargaining agreement under ch. 111:

(a) Information maintained, prepared, or provided by an employer concerning the home address, home electronic mail address, home telephone number, or social security number of an employee, unless the employee authorizes the authority to provide access to such information.

(b) Information relating to the current investigation of a possible criminal offense or possible misconduct connected with employment by an employee prior to disposition of the investigation.

(c) Information pertaining to an employee's employment examination, except an examination score if access to that score is not otherwise prohibited.

(d) Information relating to one or more specific employees that is used by an authority or by the employer of the employees for staff management planning, including performance evaluations, judgments, or recommendations concerning future salary adjustments or other wage treatments, management bonus plans, promotions, job assignments, letters of reference, or other comments or ratings relating to employees.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Clerk shall forward a copy of this resolution to State Senators Petrowski, Testin and Moulton and State Representatives Kulp, VanderMeer, Krug, and Spiros, and to the Wisconsin Counties Association.

RE: Waivers of State Mandates

Sometimes when you are looking through a cookbook for a particular recipe you stumble upon something else that piques your interest. In that same vein, when reading through the statutes and administrative code provisions looking for one thing, periodically a provision of the law pops out at you as something that might be worthwhile to delve into. Such is how I happened upon Wis. Stat. s. 66.0143, which is entitled: "Local appeals for exemption from state mandates." This sounded interesting. In the news we hear of Wisconsin and other states seeking exemptions from the federal government's application of certain rules and regulations and so it makes sense that option is at least procedurally available to the application of state mandates to municipalities. Anyway, I read over the statute and here is what it says:

66.0143. Local appeals for exemption from state mandates. (1) Definitions. In this section:

(a) "Political subdivision" means a city, village, town, or county.

(b) "State mandate" means a state law that requires a political subdivision to engage in an activity or provide a service, or to increase the level of its activities or services.

(2) Appeals for exemptions. (a) A political subdivision may file a request with the department of revenue for a waiver from a state mandate, except for a state mandate that is related to any of the following:

1. Health.

2. Safety.

(b) An administrative agency, or the department of revenue, may grant a political subdivision a waiver from a state mandate as provided in par. (c).

(c) The political subdivision shall specify in its request for a waiver its reason for requesting the waiver. Upon receipt of a request for a waiver, the department of revenue shall forward the request to the administrative agency that is responsible for administering the state mandate. The agency shall determine whether to grant the waiver and shall notify the political subdivision and the department of revenue of its decision in writing. If no agency is responsible for administering the state mandate, the department of revenue shall determine

whether to grant the waiver and shall notify the political subdivision of its decision in writing.

(3) Duration of waivers. A waiver is effective for 4 years. The administrative agency may renew the waiver for additional 4-year periods. If a waiver is granted by the department of revenue, the department may renew the waiver under this subsection.

(4) Evaluation. By July 1, 2004, the department of revenue shall submit a report to the governor, and to the appropriate standing committees of the legislature under s. 13.172(3). The report shall specify the number of waivers requested under this section, a description of each waiver request, the reason given for each waiver request, and the financial effects on the political subdivision of each waiver that was granted.

Well, that sounded interesting enough to pursue, so I took a look at the DOR's website and came up with the following instructions for pursuing a mandate waiver. The data is to be provided in conjunction with DOR's form PA-050.

General Waiver Review Criteria

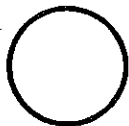
The Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR), or the responsible agency, will use the following general criteria in evaluating Section 66.0143 Wis. Stats, waiver requests received from municipalities and counties. The applicable agency will request additional information from municipalities and counties, as needed, to make informed decisions regarding unique circumstances and individual situations in which informational needs cannot be fully anticipated in advance.

1. Provide state statute and/or administrative rule number that creates the state mandate for which relief is requested.
2. Provide a detailed description of the reason for the request.
3. Describe how the waiver will enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of municipal or county operations.
4. What effects, if any, will the requested waiver have on programs or services offered by other municipalities or counties?
5. State the reason why this waiver is not related to health or safety.
6. Provide a description of alternative actions if the waiver is not granted.
7. Estimate savings expected if the waiver is granted. Include a projection of expected savings for each year of the waiver, including any capital costs required and how they are allocated. Include total expenditures in the past year for the program or service to be waived and the overall, total expenditures (tax levy and non- tax levy) for your political entity in the most recent calendar year.
8. List the names of individuals, businesses, organizations, etc., that have expressed opposition to the purposed waiver. Attach written documents of opposition (if any), letters, news articles, etc.

9. Attach the following documents to the request prior to mailing.
 - o A copy of the resolution or ordinance from your legislative body (town board, village board, city council, county board) requesting a mandate waiver. Include the recorded vote of that body.
 - o A formal attestation from the Governing Body that the waiver is not related to health or safety.
 - o A record of public hearing, if a public hearing was held, including any adverse impact on public services offered by other municipalities or counties.

The next logical step seemed to be to contact the department of revenue to ascertain if any municipalities, and in particular counties, had sought and been granted any exemptions from state mandates. The statute requires the DOR to make a report of such granted exemptions and so on 8-3-17 I made a request of the DOR for a copy of any reports they had that listed such granted exemptions. The DOR promptly responded and the only exemptions that counties have applied for are for audit reports in certain situations covered by Wis. Stat. ss. 46.036(4)(c) and 49.34(4)(c). So, there was nothing useful to glean from what other counties have done but that doesn't mean that there aren't opportunities here that simply haven't been taken advantage of. With that hope in mind, I have prepared this memo, and am sharing it with the department heads

WHEREAS, the Judicial and Legislative Committee is responsible for studying the county board rules and the committees of the board and to make recommendations for improvements, and

WHEREAS, the Judicial & Legislative Committee had encouraged the county board to modify the membership of the Executive Committee from five members, consisting of the county board chair and vice-chair and three at-large members appointed by the county board chair, to a seven-member body consisting of the county board chair and vice-chair as well as the five chairpersons of the five main committees of the county board, and

WHEREAS, the county board adopted the change to the Executive Committee thereby creating a seven member committee, in part to make sure that all of the main committees had at least one member on the Executive Committee, and

WHEREAS, the Judicial & Legislative Committee has now considered the benefits and detriments to the seven-member Executive Committee and has concluded the benefits outweigh the costs and it is appropriate to keep the seven-member committee, and

WHEREAS, the Judicial & Legislative Committee recommends that when the membership of the Executive Committee is next determined in the spring of 2018, the county board chair and vice-chair would continue to automatically be members of the Executive Committee and the other five members would continue to be the committee chairs of the other five main committees but those chairs would be elected by the committees as opposed to being selected by the county board chair, and

WHEREAS, the Judicial & Legislative Committee recommends trying such a reformulated means of selecting the Executive Committee, recognizing the County Board Chair, with the assistance of the vice-chair, would still make the appointments to the committees but the committees would be able to select their own chairs.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE WOOD COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS HEREBY RESOLVES to modify the "Rules and Committees of the Wood County Board of Supervisors" as follows:

To modify Rule 40 A. to state:

"In all committees except the Executive Committee the members of the committee shall elect a chair, vice-chair and secretary at the first meeting following their biennial reestablishment. A committee chair is entitled to vote on all matters brought before the committee unless a conflict exists."
