Project

- 1. Call meeting to order. Meeting called to order at 8:00 am. Adam would like to make a few brief comments. He is honored to be sitting in the chair role. He hopes to earn each of the committee and department head's trust. Adam announced a small change in how future HIRC meetings will be conducted. HIRC committee members and the recording secretary will be seated at the conference room main table. Department heads and other department county employees or those who wish to speak during public comments will be called to the conference table to speak by the chair of the committee. Until such time, those individuals will remain seated away from the main table.
- 2. Public comments. Pam Ironside from Wazeecha is here to speak about her ongoing project that she and Chad Schooley, Parks & Forestry Director have been discussing in recent months. Chad spoke to this indicating that as he develops the five year plan, they are working together to create more accessibility for all people within the parks system. Ms. Ironside stated she is not looking at making a big playground structure within the parks system but looking to have discussions on smaller low or no mobility accessible structures within the parks. Mr. Schooley and Ms. Ironside will continue to collaborate on this project in the future and both recommend they continue to keep other people interested in this project and to be involved as much as possible such as attending open houses or informational sessions when this comes to fruition. What Ms. Ironside is asking from the county is to continue the good working relationship. Chairman Fischer stated he would like to see this on a near future agenda for an update.

3. Approve minutes of the previous Highway, Infrastructure, and Recreation Committee meeting(s) and the minutes of the January 9, 2018 Wood County Wildlife Area Advisory Committee meeting.

Corrections to April 5, 2018 HIRC meeting minutes: Supervisor Pliml nominated Supervisor Hokamp for Secretary and Supervisor Winch for Co-Chair. Supervisor Hokamp nominated Supervisor Polach for Co-Chair. Motion to approve the previous HIRC minutes with corrections as well as other minutes listed by Pliml and second by Winch. Motion carried.

4. Review CIP department request. Chairman Fischer stated that with all the CIP's presented here today, the HIRC committee can make recommendations to the Executive committee if they see fit.

Amy Kaup is here to give a brief overview of her department's CIP. Chair Fischer stated after she is done, we will then review Highway and Parks. Ms. Kaup stated she appreciates the opportunity to be here and to explain the requests being made from IT. It's important to remember the many IT requests benefit all county employees. The upgrades include the county email system and servers. This needs to be updated in 2019.

Marla Cummings, Director of the Finance Department will send an updated copy of the accurate CIP information out to the committee as soon as possible. Supervisor Clendenning is recommending page numbers be placed on all CIP pages as well as rather than addressing a specific department head "name", it should just list as the point of contact "Department Head".

Chairman Fischer welcomes Roland Hawk for the Highway CIP presentation. Mr. Hawk started his presentation off with where the Highway Department ratings have been in the past vs. where they are now. The Highway Department seeks to have their roads better than average which is a "7". This classification is considered as a "good traveling road" and has good pavement and is in good condition. The original CIP dollar amount that was sent to finance was scaled back to \$2.5 million. Currently, they have 325 miles of highway that is in need of repair and they would be able to do about 17 miles per year at about \$150K per mile. At this rate, the roads would have about a 20 year life cycle.

Highway has allocated \$171,956 for maintenance on the tax levy. He stated they also receive many other outside revenues and they use these revenues as efficiently as they can.

The County Aid Bridge program covers replacements of culverts of 48" or bigger. They have performed a tremendous amount of town work in the recent past for replacing culverts and bridges.

GTA will be a little over \$2 Mil this year and will go directly to the roads. No equipment or materials is ever "levied". Some of it also covers operations as well such as salaries. Chairman Fischer sked if the GTA can go toward debt reduction. Roland Hawk asks that not be considered as the highway department would need that money in order to continue operating. Roland Hawk states the GTA money is left to the highway department's discretion in how it's used and if it's taken away it reduces the services to the county.

Currently, there are four bridges that need to be replaced in the county as these are in really bad shape. Supervisor Machon asked if they have checked into maximizing their revenue streams. Roland said yes they have definitely checked into this and they are maximizing in every area they can. Asphalt can be sold to municipalities within Wood County and can also be sold to DOT to a certain extent. They are maximizing this opportunity as much as they can. They will be doing some work for the DOT this coming year (about a mile) which is a

great opportunity. There is consensus of the committee that this CIP plan is fair. Chairman Fischer at this time asked for recommendations from the committee. The preliminary numbers were given and the committee will take those into consideration at the Executive Committee level.

Chairman Fischer invites Chad Schooley, the Director of the Parks Department to come to the table for his presentation. Chad handed out the five year plan focusing on 2019. Chad Schooley explained fleet vehicle purchasing. Historically, the purchase of Parks and Forestry fleet vehicles has been listed as a CIP, and not a part of the regular parks operating budget. Currently, one vehicle needs to be replaced which is a 2010 Ford ranger. This vehicle has 145K miles on it. This is the Forest Administrator's vehicle which is mostly off road and in the forests. A new wood shed is needed at North Park. Due to the new firewood ordinance, we need to have a larger shed to ensure dry firewood for our campers. The South Park Willow Run Toilet remodel is one of the last vault toilets for remodel within all of our parks. Many of our vault toilets are very old. This one specifically, is not up to ADA specs and needs to be updated. Chad Schooley pointed out that the bold items on the CIP are eligible for stewardship grant funding at a 50% match. The South Park campground expansion has been discussed for many years, as this campground continues to have the highest percentage of sites occupied throughout the summer. According to our recent survey, people want full hook-up sites as well as longer stays in our campgrounds. Moving forward with this project would generate a more consistent and steady revenue source. At the end of this year, we should have about \$300K in our non-lapsing account to pay for some of these items. In this non-lapsing account, these dollars came from previous excess revenue that was received over the past years. A portion of this fund is from equipment sales, and has been used for purchasing additional needed equipment. The Powers Bluff Development Project update will be presented to the committee at next month's meeting which is June 7, 2018 at 8:00 am at Powers Bluff in Arpin, WI. The committee is leaving the CIP as is, and the Executive Committee will discuss it at the next Executive meeting.

  - c. Fundraising/Class A Raffle License. Sandra Green explained how this license would be applied for and utilized to create raffle tickets for the Powers Bluff Development Project. For example, raffles to win a week of camping. The consensus by the committee is Ms. Green is able to move forward with applying for the license. Motion to approve the Office Supervisor report by Pliml and second by Polach. Motion carried.
- 7. Park and Forestry Director report.
  - a. 2018 Parks, Recreation, and Open Spaces Plan update. Chad Schooley stated he would like to see as many committee members as possible attend the open forum meetings which are scheduled this month. The other is scheduled on May 16, 2018 at 7pm at Powers Bluff. There will be comment cards available for additional comments as well as a comment portion where public can give ideas. A news release will be sent out early next week.
  - b. 2018 equipment purchasing update. Chad Schooley provided the new members with a little background on what was purchased so far and how he would like to move forward with the purchase of a mower and snowmobile for Powers Bluff.

- c. Powers Bluff Project update. Chad handed out the Powers Bluff County Park Trails Concept Plan to the committee. The HIRC approved moving forward with hiring a trail designer last year. This plan was paid for by the annual allotment of Ho-Chunk money that the P&F Department receives. More detail about this plan will be given during the Powers Bluff Project update at the June HIRC.
- d. Motion to approve the Parks & Forestry Director's report by Pliml and second by Hokamp. Motion carried.
- e. Special Use Permits. None.

## FORESTRY:

- 8. Forest Administrator report. Fritz introduced Gavin Hutchinson from the State DNR to the new committee. Fritz requested that we move to item (c.).
  - (c) Timber Sale Contract Extensions: #719, #724, #731, #740, #741, #744, #745. Fritz included an outline of how the committee is involved in approving these extensions. His recommendation is to extend all of the contracts until March 31, 2019 with no increase in stumpage. It is very typical that we have sales that do not get cut due to weather and other conditions.

Motion to approve the Timber Sale Contract extensions by Pliml and second by Winch. Motion carried.

- a. Timber Sale Update. Fritz handed out his monthly revenue report to the committee.
- b. Wood County Wildlife Area Advisory Committee new member recommendations for appointment. There are a total of three open positions. Two of those individuals completed applications as "returning applicants". For the third open seat, the department received four applications. A long discussion was held regarding how to move forward with choosing someone. Fritz Schubert included the "Rules of Order" for those on the committee not familiar with how this process works. Supervisor Pollach is a member of the Wood County Wildlife Area Advisory Committee and recommends the two existing individuals remain on the committee.

Motion by Supervisor Pollach to approve the two returning members, second by Supervisor Pliml. Motion carried.

The committee discussed how to choose the third person. Who can provide education to the committee that doesn't already exist? The next meeting is July 10<sup>th</sup>, 2018 and the opinion of the committee is that the most qualified position be considered. The HIRC committee is recommending phone calls be placed to each applicant for a short interview prior to the next meeting at which time, recommendations will be made.

Fritz notified the committee of an upcoming bid opening on May 18, 2018 at 8:30 am at the Parks & Forestry office in the River Block building.

Motion to approve the Forest Administrator report by Winch and second by Hokamp. Motion carried.

- 10. Approve payment of bills.

11. Revenue report. Moving forward this will be included in the packet and will indicate the "as of" revenue dates on the report.

- 16. Fuel System. They had to upgrade the fuel system because the software they used previously was obsolete. The new fuel software system will be put into motion beginning sometime this next week.
- 17. Current projects update. Discussed. Spring staff training day was held for all employees at the Highway department.

18. Approve payment of bills.

19. Accounting Supervisor's Report.

We opened bids for the brine building this morning. We have one bidder but we have some alternatives that he will discuss with them. Tentatively plan to do a meeting prior to County Board to approve this bid. Highway will schedule a special HIRC meeting prior to County Board on May 15, 2018.

## Parks and Forestry Director Report

By Chad Schooley, Parks and Forestry Director June 7, 2018 HIRC meeting

- Met with WR and Marshfield CVB's, along with Jason G., Planning and Zoning, to discuss ATV trails/routes in Wood County. Also discussed Powers Bluff conceptual trails plan.
- Met with Aqua Skiers Inc. representatives regarding possible location for cement pad for their beer tent food grills and fryers. Wood County agreed that Aqua Skiers could install concrete pad prior to the 2018 state tournament. Aqua Skiers have also signed agreement with contractor to install seamless rain gutters and snow/ice guard on roof of Red Sands Beach Pavilion. All materials and labor will be donated by the Aqua Skiers.
- Adam Dekleyn, County Planner, and I, presented a lunch and learn to county employees, which summarized the survey results for our Parks, Recreation, and Open Spaces Plan update. We also presented at Powers Bluff and Nepco Lake County Parks for the general public. Although these meetings had low attendance, we did receive some good feedback from those present.
- I attended the REGI community tour. I had an opportunity to learn a lot about the different projects going on within our community, and meet those responsible for pursuing those projects.
- We held our annual employee safety meeting on 5/10.
- The Americorp application, to host a 5 member work crew, was partially approved. However, Wood County was one of 4 entities that would have shared the crew. The approved timeframe for the crew was also shorter than what was applied for. Because we may not be ready for a crew for trail construction in August, I withdrew Wood County from the list of projects. Fortunately, now that we completed the application, it will be easier to apply for a crew in the future.
- Attended 5/15 county board meeting.
- Attended 5/29 Exec. Meeting to discuss 2019 CIP request.
- I have included a timeline summary of the Powers Bluff Development Project for your information. I will be giving an update on the project at the HIRC.
- We have requested feedback from other parks departments in WI, regarding reservation software that they utilize for camping and shelter reservations. Although the system that IT has created is functional, there are many additional features that we desire. If a decision is made to go that direction, IT will be involved with the selection process and implementation to ensure compatibility with Wood County's system.

If performance of the Work depends upon performance of other work, Contractor shall carefully examine all related work, determine whether it is suitable for performance of the Work, report immediately any unsuitable conditions to Client in writing, and allow Client reasonable time to have such unsuitable conditions remedied. Unless Contractor reports such unsuitable conditions, Contractor shall be deemed to have accepted related work as adequate for completion of the Work. Contractor shall carry out the Work in a safe manner, and shall comply with all safety measures initiated by Contractor or required by the Contract, and all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, rules, regulations and orders of any public authority for the safety of persons or property. Contractor shall be solely responsible for protection of the safety of its employees.

## 4. COMPLETION DATE.

The Work shall be completed between 6:00 AM JUNE 25, 2018 and 5:00 PM FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 2018. Time is of the essence for the performance of the Work.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this Contract, failure of Contractor to submit required or necessary reports when due, failure to perform the Work as and when required, will result in withholding of payments under this Contract.

#### 6. LIQUIDATED DAMAGES

Contractor shall pay Client \$500.00 for each day that expires after 5:00 PM FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 21, 2018 that CTH B CIR surface is not open to traffic.

## 7. DELAY.

In the event that Contractor's Work is delayed for any reason, including suspension by Client, Contractor's sole remedy shall be an extension of time equal to the period of delay. Contractor shall not be entitled to any extension for delays attributable to its own acts or omissions or occurrences under its control.

## 8. SUSPENSION OF THE WORK.

Client shall have the same right to suspend the performance of the Work, or any portion thereof, under the Contract, and Contractor's right to compensation shall also be governed thereby.

## 9. CHANGES IN WORK.

Client shall have the right to make changes in the Work in writing, and Contractor shall perform the Work as changed, subject to an equitable adjustment in price and/or time for performance, if applicable, provided Contractor provides written notice of such request for equitable adjustment within ten (10) days of receipt of the change. Contractor shall make no changes in the Work without written direction from Client, and Contractor shall not be compensated for any change made without such written direction.

In the event of Contractor's noncompliance with the requirements hereunder, Contractor may take appropriate action, including, but not limited to termination of this Contract.

#### 19. INSURANCE.

All prime contractors shall provide a Certificate of Insurance on forms acceptable to the Client. All Subcontractors shall provide and carry at a minimum, the insurance coverage and limits as indicated in the General Conditions or as required by the Contractor, whichever is higher. This shall be submitted to the Client before a Contract is signed.

The Client (Wood County) shall be named as additional insured on the Certificates of Insurance. General liability insurance shall cover property damage to existing buried utilities. Contractor shall secure, pay premiums for, and keep in force until the expiration of the Contract, or any renewal thereof, the following insurance: (1) Worker's Compensation Insurance, as required by the laws of the State of Wisconsin; (2) Owner's landlord's and tenant's bodily injury liability insurance with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 for each person, and \$5,000,000 for each accident; (3) Property Damage Liability Insurance with limits of not less than \$500,000 for each accident and a total limit of \$1,000,000 for damages arising out of bodily injuries to or death of two persons in any one accident. Other insurance not specifically mentioned herein

when required by law or other regulations. ### SPECIAL PROVISIONS

### 1) General.

Perform the work under this construction contract for Project 2018-72-02 COLD IN-PLACE RECYCLING (CIR) COUNTY HIGHWAY B, WOOD COUNTY, WISCONSIN as the plans show and execute the work as specified in the State of Wisconsin, Department of Transportation (Department), Standard Specifications for Highway and Structure Construction, 2017 Edition, as published by the department, and these special provisions.

### 2) Scope of Work.

The work under this contract shall consist of cold in-place recycled asphalt pavement, milling existing asphalt pavement, processing and mixing RAP with an asphalt stabilizing agent and water (if required) and placing and compacting the mixture for Wood County Highway (County), and all incidental items necessary to complete the work as shown on the plans and included in the proposal and contract.

# 3) Prosecution and Progress.

This project is anticipated to begin after JUNE 25, 2018 and this contract requires the Contractor to complete the work by 5:00 PM, Friday, SEPTEMBER 21, 2018. The contractor must submit a written notice with this contract when work will begin.

The engineer will issue a Notice to Begin work ten (10) days prior to the contractor's anticipated start date. Work must begin with enough time to complete work by 5:00 PM, Friday, SEPTEMBER 21, 2018.

To revise the start date, submit a written request to the engineer within five (5) business days from receiving the Notice to Begin Work. The engineer will approve or deny the request based on the conditions cited in the request and its effect on the County's scheduled resources.

The County will provide stationary traffic control devices for the project such as signs, barricades, and barrels, will repair yielding areas within the project area to allow the contractor to place a sound CIR pavement, and will remove adjacent shoulder material from the edge of the existing asphalt to minimize contamination of the CIR pavement. The Contractor shall provide flaggers and any additional traffic control for a moving operation or operation outside the project limits.

### 4) Certificate of Insurance

The prime Contractor and all sub-Contractors shall provide a Certificate of Insurance on forms acceptable to Wood County Highway Department. This shall be submitted to the County before a contract is signed.

Minimum Limit Requirements:

A. General Liability \$1,000,000.00
B. Automobile Liability \$500,000.00
C. Workman's Compensation \$500,000.00

### 5) Traffic

The County will provide stationary traffic control for the projects, such as signs, barricades and barrels. The County will close the road to through traffic however; the contractor shall keep the road open to local traffic during construction and provide flaggers and any additional traffic control for a moving operation or operation outside the project limits.

# 6) Holiday Work Restrictions.

There are no Holiday Work Restrictions for CTH B.

### 7) Utilities.

There are utilities within the project limits, the Contractor is to work around the utilities, and no conflicts are anticipated.

### 8) Liquidated Damages

Contractor and County recognize that Wood County Highway B is a vital route for local traffic. It shall be open to traffic as soon as possible. Contractor shall pay the Owner \$500.00 per day for each day that expires after 5:00 PM, Friday, September 21, 2018 that County Highway B is not completed and open freely to all traffic.

A full day is counted if the roadway is not fully paved with CIR and compacted for traffic to use in both directions by 5:00 PM each day. Liquidated Damages will not be charged as long as all of the contracted work is complete.

# 9) Cold-In-Place Recycled Asphalt Pavement

### A Description

Cold in-place recycling (CIR) consists of:

- Milling existing asphalt pavement
- Processing and mixing RAP with an asphalt stabilizing agent and water (if required), and
- Placing and compacting the mixture.

### **B** Materials

# B.1 Reclaimed Asphalt Pavement (RAP) Material

- (i) The RAP shall be milled from the existing roadway and processed in-place.
- (2) The RAP shall be free of contamination of base material, shoulder material, concrete, silt, clay, or other deleterious materials.
- (3) The milled and processed material shall conform to the following gradation prior to addition of the stabilizing agent:

Sieve Size	Percent Passing
1 ½" (37.5 mm)	98 to 100
1"	90 to 100

### **B.2** Asphalt Stabilizing Agent

- (1) Use one of the following asphalt stabilizing agents, as specified in the contract documents:
- A. Foamed asphalt
- B. Emulsion CSS-1 or HFMS-2S

### **B.2.1 Foamed Asphalt**

- (1) Foamed asphalt shall be produced with a performance graded asphalt binder; without polymer modification; in accordance to (WDOT) standard spec 455.
- (2) Asphalt binder performance grade for foamed asphalt shall be PG 46-34 or PG 52-34.
- (3) Asphalt binder shall be sufficiently heated to meet the expansion and half-life criteria; not to exceed 375° F.
- (4) Asphalt binder shall produce asphalt foam with a minimum expansion ratio of 8 and half-life of no less than 6 seconds.

### **B.2.2 Emulsion Type CSS-1 or HFMS-2S**

(1) CSS-1 or HFMS-2S type emulsion shall meet the requirements of (WDOT) standard spec 455.

### B.2.3 Water

- (1) Water may be added to the RAP at the milling head and/or in a mixing chamber.
- (2) Water added to the RAP, used for foaming asphalt, or incorporated with the asphalt emulsion shall meet the requirements of standard spec 501.2.4.

### **B.3 Mixture Design**

(1) Unless stated otherwise stated in the contract documents, do not perform a mix design process for standard asphalt emulsion or foamed asphalt. Use the following application rates

per square yard inch (per square meter per mm) of compacted thickness when no mix design is performed.

Standard Asphalt Emulsion	0.30 gallons (emulsion)	1.325 L
Foamed Asphalt	0.0011 tons (asphalt binder)	1.175 kg

### C Construction

### C.1 General

- (1) Unless the contract provides otherwise, keep the road open to traffic during construction.
- (2) Perform CIR operations; only when the air temperature approximately 3 feet above grade, in shade, and away from artificial heat sources is above 50°F and when the nighttime ambient air temperature is above 45°F the night prior and following; unless approved otherwise by the engineer.
- (3) Do not perform CIR operations during inclement weather; such as rain or fog; that will not allow proper mixing, placing, and/or compacting of the mixture.

### C.2 Equipment

- (1) Equipment used for CIR shall be subject to approval by the engineer.
- (2) Tankers supplying hot stabilizing agent components shall be equipped to constantly monitor temperature within the tank.

### C.2.1 Milling Machine

- (1) Milling units; not inclusive of pre-mill/wedge-cut milling units; shall be capable of milling the existing pavement full lane width to the depth shown on the plans, specified in the contract or directed by the engineer, in a single pass.
- (2) The units shall be equipped with automatic depth control, shall maintain constant cutting depth and width, uniform grade, and uniform slope.
- (3) For processes not incorporating additional screening, sizing, or crushing; the milling unit shall be capable of producing RAP sized as specified in B.1.
- (4) Use of a heating device to soften the pavement is not permitted.
- (5) Contractor shall maintain the existing centerline when milling and placing CIR pavement.

C.2.2 Screening, Crushing, and Sizing Equipment

(1) Processes requiring additional screening, sizing, or crushing, shall include a unit with a closed circuit system capable of continuously returning oversized material to the crusher until all milled material entering the screening, crushing, or sizing equipment meets the gradation requirements of section B.1.

### C.2.3 Mixing Unit

- (1) Processed RAP shall be mixed with the stabilizing agent and water in a mixing unit; defined as the milling machine cutter housing, a separate mixing chamber, or a pugmill.
- (2) The asphalt stabilizing agent shall be applied; using a computer controlled additive system; uniformly at the predetermined application rate. The metering of the stabilizing agent must be monitored through a calibrated pump providing a continuous readout of quantities.
- (3) The additive system shall contain separate pumping systems for adding stabilizing agent and water. Each system shall have an inspection or test nozzle for stabilizing agent and/or water sampling.
- (4) The system shall be capable of producing a uniformly mixed homogeneous recycled pavement mixture.

### C.2.4 Paving Equipment

- (1) The placement and shaping of the recycled pavement mixture shall be completed using a self-propelled paver or screed integral to the recycling equipment meeting the requirements of standard spec 450.3.1.4; revised to exclude the requirement of an activated screed or strike-off assembly.
- (2) The screed shall not be heated.
- (3) If utilizing a self-propelled paver, the material shall be transferred directly into the paver hopper from the recycling equipment or with a pick-up device. When a pick-up device is used, the entire windrow shall be removed from the milled surface and transferred to the paver hopper.

### C.2.5 Compaction Equipment

- (1) Compaction equipment shall be self-propelled and meet the requirements of standard spec 450.3.1.5
- (2) The number, weight, and types of rollers shall be as necessary to achieve the specified compaction.

### C.3 Constructing CIR

### C.3.1 Preparation

- (1) Prior to initiating CIR operations, remove from the roadway any vegetation, standing water, loose crack filler, and any other deleterious materials within the width of pavement to be recycled.
- (2) Inspect the pavement surface for areas of yielding subgrade. Yielding areas will be repaired by the County prior to CIR operations.
- (3) Contractor shall maintain the existing centerline when milling and placing CIR pavement.
- (4) The County will blade the existing base aggregate roadway shoulders away from the asphaltic surface edge to minimize contamination of the CIR pavement.

### C.3.2 Processing and Placement of Recycled Pavement Mixture

- (1) Mill the existing pavement to the required depth and width indicated on the plans.
- (2) Further process the milled RAP material as necessary by crushing, screening, and/or sizing to the gradation requirements of B.1.
- (3) Blend the RAP material with the specified proportions of stabilizing agent and water; produce a uniform and homogeneous recycled mixture. The Engineer may vary the application rate of the asphalt stabilizing agent as required by existing pavement conditions.
- (4) Spread the recycled mixture to the grade, elevations, and slopes specified on the plans; avoiding tearing or scarring of the recycled pavement surface.
- (5) Ensure proper material transfer, handling, and spreading to prevent particle segregation.
- (6) Contractor shall maintain the existing centerline when milling and placing CIR pavement.
- (7) Longitudinal joints between successive CIR operations shall be overlapped a minimum of 3 inches. Transverse joints between successive CIR operations shall be overlapped a minimum of 2 feet.

### C.4 Compaction

# **C.4.1 Compaction Requirements**

- (1) On the first day of production, construct a control strip to identify the target wet density for the CIR layer. The control strip construction and density testing will occur under the direct observation and/or assistance of the Engineer.
- (2) Unless the Engineer approves otherwise, construct control strips to a minimum dimension of 500 feet long and one full lane width.
- (3) Completed control strips may remain in-place to be incorporated into the final roadway cross-section.

- (4) Construct additional control strips, at a minimum, when: There is a significant change in mix proportions, weather conditions, or other controlling factors, the Engineer may require construction of test strips to check target density.
- (5) Construct control strips using equipment and methods representative of the operations to be used for constructing the CIR layer.
- (6) After compacting the control strip with a minimum of 2 passes, mark and take density measurements at 3 random locations, at least 1 ½ feet from the edge of the CIR layer. Subsequent density measurements will be taken at the same 3 locations.
- (7) After each subsequent pass of compaction equipment over the entirety of the control strip, take density measurements at the 3 marked locations. Continue compacting and testing until the increase in density measurements is less than 2.0 lb/ft3, or the density measurements begin to decrease.
- (8) Upon completion of control strip compaction, take 10 randomly located density measurements within the limits of the control strip, at least 1 ½ feet from the edge of the base. The final measurements recorded at the 3 locations under article paragraph (6) of this section may be included as 3 of the 10 measurements. Average the 10 measurements to obtain the control strip target density.

### C.4.2 Compaction Requirements

- (1) Compact the CIR layer to a required density of 93% of the target density.
- (2) Perform initial rolling with a pneumatic tired roller. Perform final rolling using steel wheel rollers, either in static or vibratory mode, to eliminate pneumatic tire marks.

### C.5 Surface Requirements

- (1) Test the pavement surface at regular intervals, and engineer selected locations, using a 10-foot straightedge or other engineer specified device.
- (2) The engineer may direct the repair of surface deviations greater than 1/4 inch between two surface contact points. High points shall be corrected by reworking, rerolling, trimming, milling, or grinding. Depressions may be corrected by reworking or have a tack coat applied and be filled with HMA immediately prior to placement of the surface treatment.

### C.6 Maintaining the Work

- (1) After compaction is complete, the contractor will determine when the CIR is stable to open to traffic.
- (2) After opening to traffic, and prior to placing a surface treatment, the surface of the recycled pavement shall be maintained in a condition suitable for safe movement of traffic.

- (3) The recycled pavement surface shall be protected and maintained from standing water, deleterious substances, and/or other damage.
- (4) Any damage to the recycled pavement shall be repaired by the contractor prior to placement of the upper layer or acceptance of recycled pavement from the engineer at no additional cost to the department;

### C.9 Curing and Surfacing

### C.9.1 Curing

- (1) Application of a surface treatment will not be allowed until the moisture content of the CIR layer is not more than 0.3% above the residual moisture content or 2.5, whichever is greater.
- (2) If the moisture content of the CIR layer does not reduce to 2.5%; the surface treatment may be applied after the change in moisture content is less than 0.3% for three consecutive calendar days.
- (3) The Engineer may adjust the drying period depending on field conditions. The CIR shall be retested until the moisture content is at or below the limits stated above.

### C.9.2 Tack Coat

(1) Tack coat to be applied by Wood County.

### C.9.3 Surfacing

(1) Surfacing materials, equipment, and construction to be performed by Wood County.

### D Measurement

- (1) The department will measure the Asphalt Stabilizing Agent incorporated into the work by the ton, acceptably completed; as metered through a calibrated pump, or through delivered ticket quantity.
- (2) The department will measure the Cold-In-Place Pavement Partial Depth bid item as acceptably completed by the square yard (SY).

(1) The department will pay for the measured quantities at the contract unit price under the following bid item:



1. Location:

5232 Second Avenue, Pittsville, Wisconsin.

2. Legal Descr.:

City of Pittsville SUBD NW NE S34 T23 R3E LOT 1, AND LOT 3, WCCSM #10278

3. Property Data:

The property consists of the main building with a block office area (Lot 1) and the storage shed (Lot 3). The 7,280 square foot pre-engineered building is clear span and has a 28' center height with 14' sidewalls. The interior clear height is 16' and is limited by the overhead heating system. The age of the buildings is not known. There is one bathroom, a dispatch office, break room and utility room in the concrete block area. The roof is covered with ribbed steel and the condition is unknown but assumed to be in average condition. The windows are vinyl clad casement style and have been replaced. The interior office finish includes painted concrete block walls, a gypsum board ceiling and painted or unfinished concrete. The office heating is supplied by a Ducane forced air, gas furnace and the remaining building has infrared tube heaters. The foundation is assumed to be a frost wall and the slab thickness is assumed to be six inches. The parking area is asphalt and gravel. I.	Description
	(a.) The Owner, for and in consideration of the mutual agreements hereinafter contained, hereby agrees to give the Operator non- exclusive use of designated areas within <u>North Wood County Park</u> , for the purpose of selling ice cream products from an approved mobile vehicle.
П.	<u>Term</u>
	(a.) To use said premises for the <u>2018</u> summer season as set forth herein.
III.	Sales Operating Fee
	Operator shall pay Owner \$for the 2018 season as set forth herein.
	(a.) The Sales Operating Fee shall be paid to the Wood County Parks and Forestry Department prior to operating within approved park.
IV. <u>O</u>	peration of Business
(b.	Operator is allowed to operate from <u>June 7, 2018 – October 1, 2018</u> during designated times and at designated locations.  Allowable operating times 12:00pm – 8:00pm.  All sales and business shall be conducted at designated areas. Those areas include: <b>North Wood County Park</b> -adjacent to the old concession stand near the beach, disc golf parking lot, upper shower building parking lot, lower shower building parking lot, and across the road from the ranger

(d.) The use of audible devices, for the purpose of notifying park users of the presence of the mobile vehicle, shall not cause annoyance to other park users. For this reason, the use of audible devices shall be limited to when the mobile vehicle enters the park, and until the vehicle is parked at the

- designated location within the park. The audible device shall be silenced while the Operator is conducting sales at the designated locations. **No Sales** shall be conducted outside of the designated areas.
- (e.) License and all necessary permits for restaurant operation to be secured by the Operator and copies of such provided to Wood County Parks and Forestry Department prior to first day of operation.
- (f.) All supplies and materials used in the operation of the food and beverage sales shall be furnished by the Operator. Operator shall keep the Concession Area clean, attractive, and orderly at all times.
- (g.) Operator shall comply with all applicable provisions of the Health Code and all laws of the State of Wisconsin and the County of Wood.

### V. Insurance, Risk and Loss

(a.) The Wood County Parks and Forestry Department will not be responsible for any losses suffered by the Operator due to fire, theft, vandalism or any other casualty. Operator shall provide proof of 1 million dollar liability insurance that covers their business functions and employees and agents under this agreement at the time of execution of said agreement. Wood County shall be named additionally insured on this policy.

# VI. Assignment

(a.) This agreement may not be sublet or assigned, in whole or in part, without the prior express written consent of the Wood County Parks and Forestry Department.

### VII. Relationship of Parties

(a.) Operator is an independent entity operating the food vending service within the Wood County Parks and Forestry Department pursuant to this agreement. Nothing herein or in the operation of said food vending service shall be construed to create a partnership or joint venture between the parties hereto. Operator and the persons and volunteers operating said food vending service are not agents, employees, or representatives of the Wood County Parks and Forestry Department or of Wood County.

### VIII. Default

(a.) If default is made or if the Operator shall break any of the covenants herein contained or willfully do injury to the premises, the Wood County Parks and Forestry Department shall have the right to declare this agreement void and the term ended. The Wood County Parks and

Forestry Department shall have the right to any remedies of law appropriate as determined by the default or breach of this agreement.
